SUNY Downstate

- SUNY Downstate Health Sciences University is critical to the community, creating a diverse workforce that primarily remains instate upon graduation
- Clinical placements for the school of medicine rely on external health systems, with SUNY Downstate Hospital supporting about 1/3 of necessary placements
- The physical plant at SUNY Downstate
 Hospital is at end of life, and will require over
 \$3 billion in capital and at least 8-10 years to
 replace with limited capital to fund
 replacement
- Even with State support and significant DSH resources of more than \$120 million annually, SUNY Downstate hospital has been challenged financially with material operating and cash flow losses

- The community continues to experience a high disease burden, with excess inpatient services and high, unmet demand for primary and ambulatory care access
- Consistent with national trends, demand for outpatient services is expected to be significant
- The plan to build a stronger Downstate is a unique and timely opportunity to restructure, reimagine, and ensure a positive impact for the community







- By enrollment and graduates, SUNY Downstate is the largest medical school in NYC and is in the top 3 in NYS
- SUNY Downstate had the most "underrepresented in medicine (URIM)" medical school graduates in NYS in the class of 2023
- Though just 20% of U.S. nurses are minorities, 70% of SUNY Downstate's nursing students come from diverse populations

 The University Hospital at Downstate has significant inpatient capacity available today and would need critical infrastructure upgrades to modernize and/or replace the facility




High Demand for Primary Care and Specialty Physicians Likely Contributing to High Rates Of Chronic Conditions

Number of General Practitioners per 100K Population by Neighborhood (2020)


